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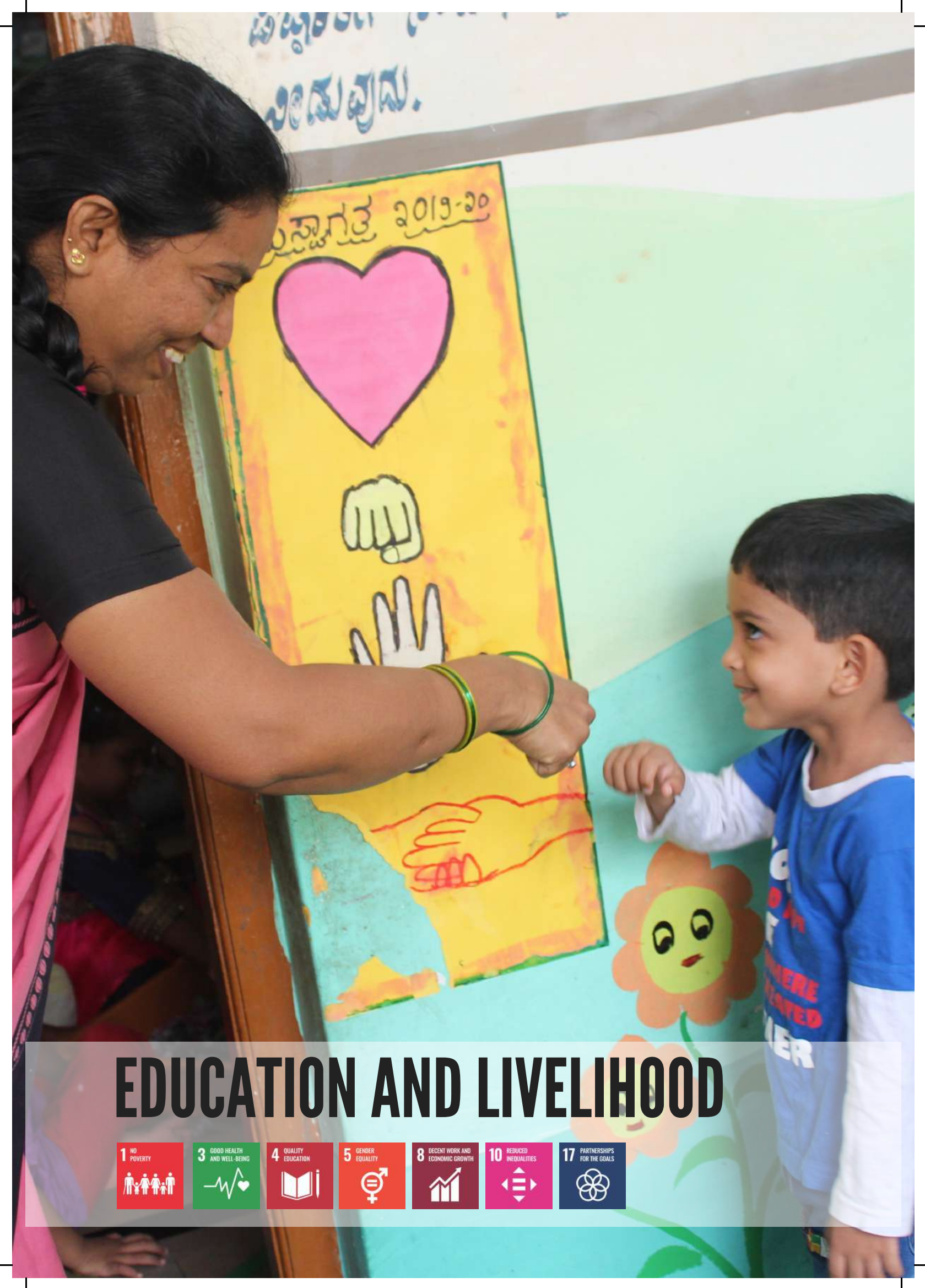

EDUCATION AND LIVELIHOOD

Children's experiences in early life are responsible for the development of their cognitive, physical, social and emotional skills and thus succeeding in life. This development is further enhanced by supportive family, proper nutrition and health care, and so on. Our Born Learning Campaign seeks to address the needs of this critical age. Our objective is to create school readiness among children of 3-6 years of age through technical-based Early Childhood Education provided at Anganwadi centres.

This program seeks to ensure access to a holistic, optimal learning environment for the children which includes appropriate health, hygiene and nutrition awareness through the active involvement of the community stakeholders, specifically parent groups. UWBe launched the cyclic BLC Fellowship Training Program across 300 centres where the BLC staff, Anganwadi workers and helpers are trained in capacity building activities. We also integrated cost-effective, native-grown, healthy foods into children's and in general, the whole family's diet. Mothers also participated in the Poshakshala activity and developed teaching & learning materials with indigenous materials.

From 10 Balwadis (currently known as Anganwadis) in 2012, BLC has grown to 730 centres across the country.

UWBe is now Centre of Excellence for Born Learning Campaign across India. The BLC program's exclusivity to the Anganwadis encourage parents to move from private pre-schooling to cost-effective traditional Anganwadi set-ups. This also ensures mingling of children from various backgrounds which builds good mind-sets in their early years.

Apart from the 3-6 age group, we also work in the primary education of school going children. At schools, we helped create Sikshana Student Clubs where students learn from each other through peer-teaching relationships so as to create a culturally rich environment. At the higher education levels, we focus emphasizes on skill-building initiatives for school drop-outs and those who are unable to find a place in mainstream education to get skilled thus leading to future sustainable employment. Apart from providing scholarships for economically backward but meritorious college-going students, we train youth under 5 domains of skill development – Assistant Beauty therapy, Industrial Sewing, Machine Operations, Food & Beverages, Retail Management and Customer Relationship Management – and they are placed with an average salary of Rs 15,000 per month.

With increase in global temperature, rising sea levels and disappearing green cover, if we do not act soon to protect our environment, the results will be disastrous. This requires us to model our interventions along the lines of sustainability. A huge part of environment-related concerns for Bangalore is the water crisis. We also understand that battling this problem requires us to look back to our sustainable ancestral practices and also incorporate biodiversity in increasing the green cover.

United Way Bengaluru took a conscious decision to address this concern in three different ways – through lake rejuvenation, watershed management and increasing biodiversity. These mutually reinforce each other.

Lake Rejuvenation

Bangalore, in specific, has been fighting the water crisis for quite a while. Rampant urbanization, felling of trees and brazen lake encroachment has led to severe shortage of water. Bangalore is bejeweled with numerous lakes. Unfortunately, most of them are on the brink of death.

Our Wake the Lake project works towards reviving these dying lakes, in the hope to bring them back to their original glory.

Watershed Management

Watershed management focusses on effective conservation of soil and water resources for sustainable production. It implies rational utilization of land and water resources for optimum and sustained production, with the minimum of hazard to natural resources.

Biodiversity

Increasing biodiversity is as significant as lake rejuvenation processes and watershed management when it comes to building environment sustainability. There are certain unique processes that we employ in increasing biodiversity.

We still have a long way to go. But with perseverance and consistency, we believe that we can bring about a positive change in our environment. Finally, we strongly feel that sustainability is not something only to be done. It is, most importantly, a mind-set. Let us promise ourselves to think and do sustainable.

RURAL RISING

As a non-profit organization, we realized that rural is as crucial as urban, if not more. There is no doubt that sustainable is the way forward. Most of our native technologies are sustainable in nature and the people also share the same mindset and employ such practices. In strengthening such a community, we are indirectly promoting sustainability. We believe in rising for the rural! Under this vertical, we have tried to branch out in various directions by focusing our areas of intervention such as environment sustainability, education, youth success, economic livelihood and access to health in rural regions.

Nandi

Nandi Hills was the charming summer residence of Tipu Sultan. The well-known hill fortress is situated in the Nandi village. The once lush landscape of the village diminished as the Nandi lake dried up and along with it, its groundwater tables. The scarcity of water caused water bills to shoot up and its natural groves saw their own slow demise. In such a situation, we needed a 360-degree intervention into the village development. United Way of Bengaluru carried out this holistic intervention model through three focus areas – watershed management, environment sustainability and education.

Hassan

Undoubtedly, United Way of Bengaluru believes in incorporating sustainability in all its projects. We introduced “student mini grants” which are grants for student-driven projects where a student leads a group that also consists of the panchayat development officer, a representative from the gram panchayat members (president/ vice-president/ members), a school teacher, elders, youth, women.

Sompura

Sompura has seen interventions in the areas of environment sustainability and watershed management. Both of them work hand-in-hand.

Doddaballapur

UWBe has tried to undertake projects towards the wellbeing of the villagers and livelihood options for women. These have been integrated for maximum efficiency.

Bangarpet

At Bangarpet, our interventions have been in the education field, economic mobility and watershed management.

Palakkad

We undertook extensive watershed management at Palakkad through wells, ponds, roof water harvesting, water absorption trenches, check dams and gully plugs.

Education

Corporate volunteers also engage in making Training and Learning materials for children at Anganwadis. This makes the volunteers understand the need and importance of Early childhood education. During such activities, they create Training and Learning materials for children in Anganwadis between age of 0 to 6, which also encourages volunteers to support the children in learning process.

On a final note, United Way of Bengaluru plans to branch out into other areas of intervention too in future. If we all do not come together collectively to bring forth societal welfare, things are ought to look bleak. In mobilizing corporate volunteers for such activities, we not only promote Corporate Social Responsibility but also inculcate a sense of volunteering and giving in the individuals at a more personal level.

Opinion

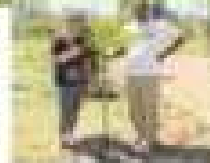
