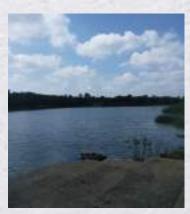

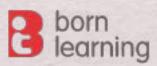

Scholarship and mentorship for deserving students

The program is meant to promote higher education and career opportunities for deserving students who need support. Under the program, deserving students from economically disadvantaged communities were encouraged to apply and selected based on a systematic and transparent process. Alongside scholarship support, students are mentored and groomed with requisite life skills.

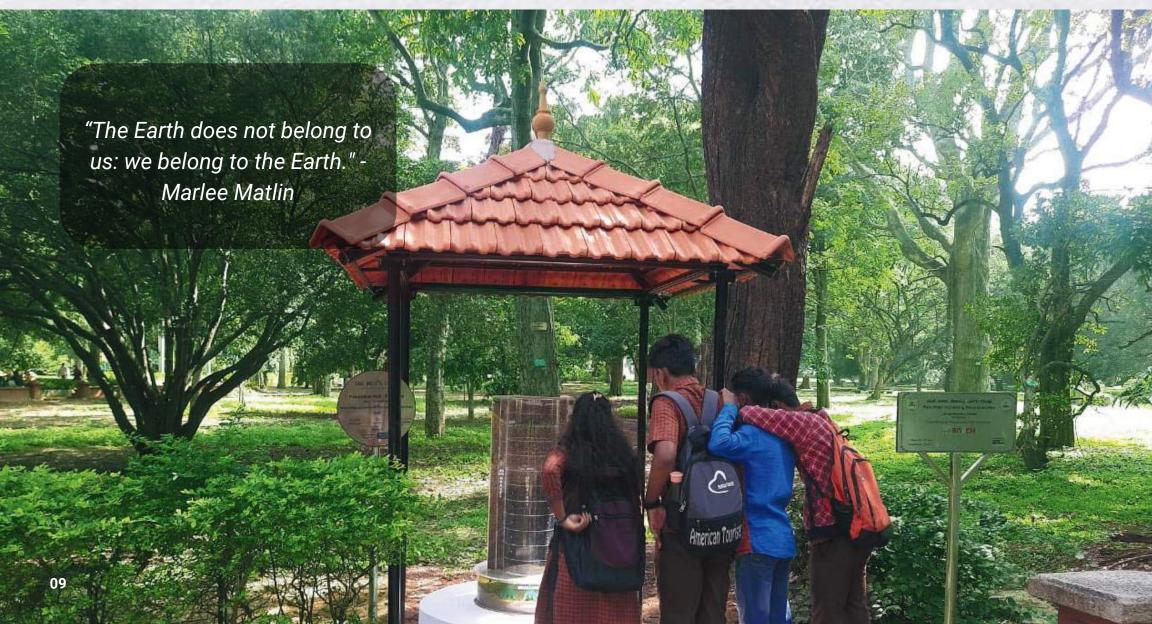






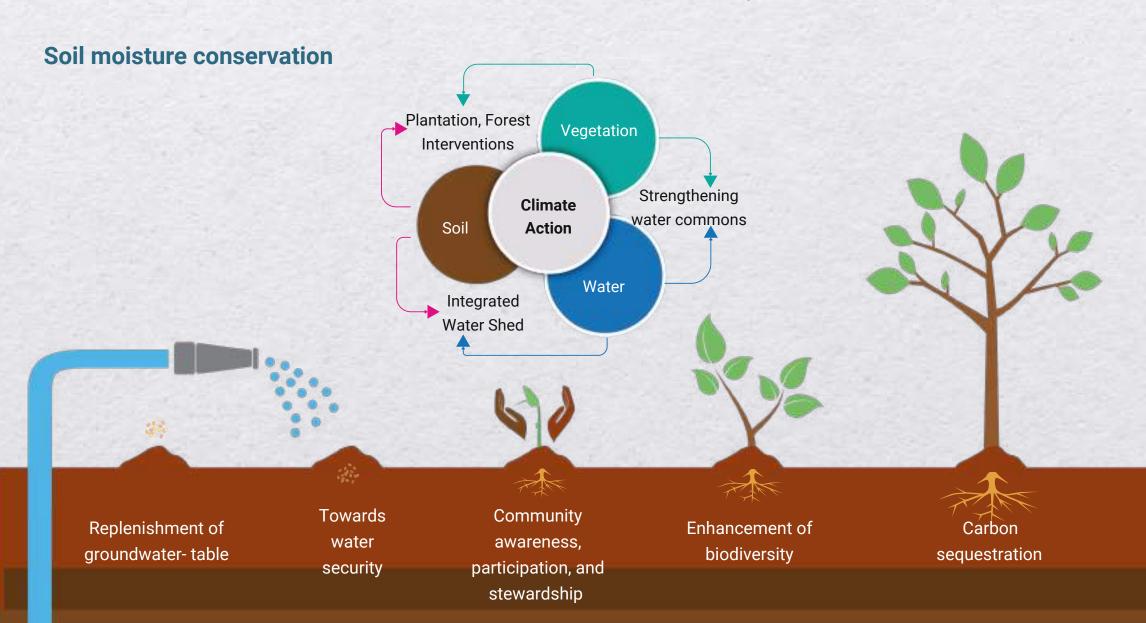




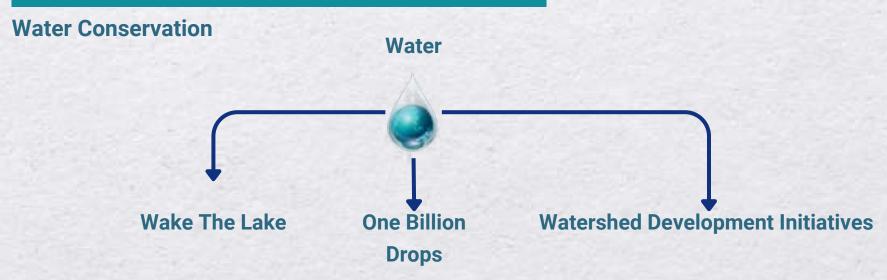


Overview

Promote effective water conservation and improve water security by demonstrating a replicable and scalable model of integrated watershed management, adopting scientific and data-backed approaches across the country.



Flagship programs and key interventions



Wake The Lake

Started as a campaign to restore and protect the dying lakes of urban areas in Bengaluru, the Wake the Lake initiative has expanded to rural areas. The effort is towards promoting water security through active citizen groups' involvement. The initiative focuses on scientific measurements of outcome and impact, aligned to diversity, soil moisture conservation and carbon sync calculations.



One Billion Drops

The One Billion Drops campaign conserves one billion litres of rainwater annually by creating 10,000 percolation wells in and around Bengaluru. The initiative is executed with stakeholders, including government authorities such as Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP), CSR partners, and community members. Hundreds of percolation wells have been built across parks and large campuses in the city this year, and a clear definition of impact using a watershed approach and zone-wise measurement of groundwater table has been put in place this year.



Watershed Development Initiatives

The Watershed development typically involves activities aimed at conserving and managing water resources within a specific geographic area, such as a watershed or catchment area. This year, activities around restoration, rejuvenation and creation of structures like farm ponds, gabion, check dams, loose boulder structures etc. have been carried out which are helping towards promoting water security.

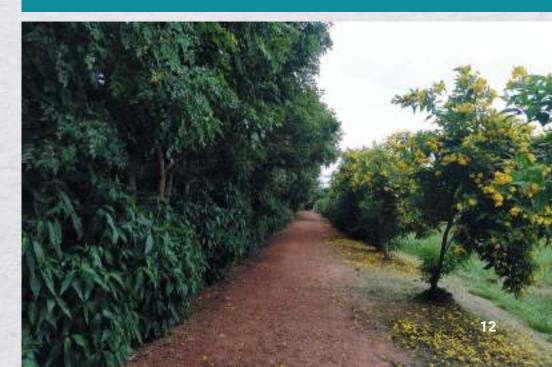

Afforestation

Enhancing green cover through planting our interventions is helping improve biodiversity. Our plantation methods are selected based on geography, land pattern, biomass, and existing biodiversity. Focusing on indigenous and endangered species, based on the suitability of the areas around, has been fundamental to all our plantation activities. Such activities have been organized around lakes and water bodies, parks, institutional campuses and forest areas where the green cover is not as thick. In addition, this year, we also started some exploratory interventions, including the lantana project undertaken to remove the weed and train local people to make furniture out of lantana as a source of livelihood.



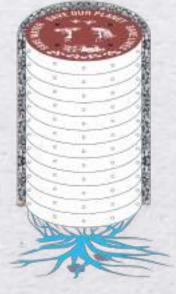
