With your continued support, we look forward to FY 2025–26, ready to deepen our impact, expand our reach, and build thriving communities for all.





Global Meets Local

The President & CEO of United Way Worldwide (UWW), Angela F. Williams, made her first ever visit to United Way Bengaluru and other chapters in India this year. This visit was a wonderful means for us to connect with the wider United Way family, sharing the impact of our diverse interventions, and allowing for conversations around our collective vision for creating lasting positive change.



Partnering for Change

United Way Bengaluru, in partnership with NGO Parihar, a shelter home for destitute women and children run by the Bengaluru City Police, has launched a Livelihood Support Program to help vulnerable women become self-reliant through income-generating opportunities.

Through Parihar's support, the e-rickshaw initiative empowers women from vulnerable communities by training them to operate e-rickshaws and partner with cab aggregators such as Namma Yatri. Each e-rickshaw is equipped with a smartphone to manage ride requests efficiently. The women who received the e-autos have overcome challenges such as domestic violence, physical disabilities, financial hardships as single parents, and the responsibility of caring for unwell family members. Many began their journeys by learning to drive and independently renting autos before joining this initiative, made possible through the support and guidance of Parihar.

This partnership reflects the strength of public-privatepeople collaboration in driving social progress and promoting eco-friendly mobility in the city.

With the rising concern of the water crisis across the country, and cities like Bengaluru struggling with sorely depleted groundwater levels, we continue to strengthen our focus on expanding watershed initiatives to improve water security. In line with our efforts to strengthen partnerships, we have also worked alongside government bodies to improve coastal ecology with mangrove rewilding efforts.

As depicted below, the various climate interventions contribute to the major outcomes of increasing water security, enriching soil fertility

and biodiversity, enhancing green cover, and providing sustainable access to renewable electricity, particularly in rural areas.





Increasing Water Security

This year, we rejuvenated 13 lakes and 20 ponds in urban and rural areas, enhancing the water-holding capacity of the lakes, supporting flood control and groundwater recharge, and improving biodiversity and ecological health.

The **Wake the Lake campaign** aspires to transform select lakes into models of urban water conservation, through scientific rejuvenation, community engagement, and governance partnerships.



Under the **One Billion Drops campaign**, we constructed **3,686 percolation wells**, scaling up the campaign objective of percolating and conserving 1 billion litres of rainwater annually. We have worked in collaboration with local administrative bodies and academic and research partners.

Afforestation: : Enhancing Green Cover & Enriching Biodiversity

Mangroves Matter protects and restores vital ecosystems along coastal areas. These mangroves provide a range of environmental, social, and economic benefits, acting as carbon sinks with thriving marine ecosystems, which in turn serve as livelihood for local communities.

Afforestation helps replenish native flora and fauna, reduce carbon emissions, and improve soil fertility while increasing green cover to support biodiversity. Our **urban and rural forestry** initiatives focus on restoring green spaces, enhancing ecological health, and creating resilient livelihoods by protecting and reviving degraded land.

This year marked 3 years of collaboration with the Department of Horticulture, alongside whom we have contributed to the development of a Thorn forest, a Dense forest, as well as 3 ponds.


Biodiversity Enhancement

An Avifauna Assessment was conducted at **Dr. MH Marigowda Centre for Plant Conservation & Development, Koratagere,** to assess the diversity and distribution of birds following our afforestation initiatives.



Carbon Sequestration

Another major outcome of our climate initiatives is a reduction in the amount of carbon emissions, and strengthened natural resources that remove CO2 from the atmosphere. Initiatives from lake rejuvenations to plantations and mangrove rewilding, all contribute to carbon sequestration.



As per benchmarking consistent with Verra standards, our 50-hectare Mangrove site in Tiruvallur was projected to generate approximately **30 carbon credits per hectare** annually.

Environmental Stewardship

In Karnataka, the **Bovi Vaddar (well-digger) community** saw their livelihood decline with the rise of borewells and depleting groundwater levels. Many shifted to daily wage work, struggling to sustain their families. Through the OBD campaign, we have connected with the community to use their specialised skills. They have manually dug nearly 7,000 wells since 2019, earning stable incomes that help feed their families, educate their children, and secure their futures by connecting with their roots.

Meanwhile, in coastal Tamil Nadu, couples like Saraswati and Rajendran care for mangrove saplings by Pulicat Lake. Living in a solar-powered hut on site, they nurture the plants until they can thrive on their own. This work not only provides them with steady meals and income but also gives them pride in protecting their environment. As stewards, they inspire others in the community to join in, spreading awareness and responsibility for climate action.

Both stories show how local communities, when supported, can revive existing traditions and create lasting impact for themselves and the environment.








Education is a primary focus of much of CSR funding in the country, and it has remained a major focal point for United Way Bengaluru for years. Our education initiatives aim to provide safe, conducive learning environments to children through each stage of life.

Working alongside pre-established structures and in convergence with government approaches and the ICDS, we have created **model 'Saksham Anganwadis'** that ensure nutrition and learning outcomes for children aged 0-6, while we provide **targeted capacity building training** to Anganwadi workers and helpers.

Our programs focus on improved access to digital technology, strengthen access to STEAM curriculum in schools, and provide holistic aspects of school development from WaSH to scholarship programs.

Early Childhood Care & Education



Working with close to 400 Anganwadi Centres across 6 states this year, the Born Learning Campaign enriches early education by strengthening Anganwadi Centres through a multi-dimensional approach.

In 2024-25, special focus was given to **First 1000 Days training**, where we reached parts of Bihar, UP, and Maharashtra with targeted awareness building around Early Childhood Care and Development. **1,145 first 1,000 days kits** were distributed.

(Addressing Hunger & Health)

Anganwadi Centres play a crucial role in combating malnutrition and other community health concerns. Our interventions have worked to address health and nutrition in sustainable ways like the establishment of nutrition gardens at Anganwadis. through which they gain access to fresh vegetables.

Integrated School Development Program

Our aim is to ensure improved and quality education in all Government and Government aided schools across the country by providing access to facilities that ensure safe and effective learning environment, relevant resources that ensure effective teaching and learning engagement of all students, across different age groups without any discrimination.

We have enhanced school infrastructure, integrated technology for digital learning, strengthened sanitation and hygiene facilities, promoted inclusivity, and fostered a holistic approach to education that supports academic growth, life skills, and overall well-being of students at scale.

A focus on STEAM learning

Recent studies show that while rural populations consist of 60% of the country's population, barely 6% of youth in STEM fields hail from these communities. Our STEAM approach aims to bridge this gap between the urban elite and underrepresented communities. This includes STEAM learning labs and interactive spaces to develop higher-order thinking, and encouraging students with experiential teaching and learning.

We have ended the year with our newly launched flagship campaign, spark. Spark brings resources into the classroom, with a focus on the capacity building of teachers to convert the class into a more effective learning space.

INTEGRATED RURAL DEVELOPMENT

All our rural interventions are implemented through an organized, integrated rural development campaign **Rural Rising**. Here, we have focused on building self-sustaining rural communities through an approach that aligns Government and community priorities, assuring access to quality education, better health resources, access to improved livelihood opportunities, and cleaner environment that all community members benefit from.

This year, community engagement was deepened by working more closely with local systems, leading to improved quality of outcomes and greater sustainability, ensuring that the interventions are carried forward independently.

Education

Much like the organization's wider efforts towards education, Rural Rising's education component ensures to address multiple facets of education, catering to the needs of the local area where the project is being implemented. This year, we worked to construct and refurbish Anganwadi centres and train Anganwadi workers on ECCE, while also setting up digital screens, STEM corners, and STEM labs in rural schools.

Some community spaces were constructed to contribute to the education of individuals across the village who may need access to books and digital learning.

Towards higher education, youth receive support through improved access to digital literacy, skill training, and scholarships.

Contributing to the holistic growth and social inclusion in diverse rural areas, we have invested in providing sports equipment and training in schools, with children learning and competing in football in Wayanad, Kerala, volleyball, kho-kho and kabaddi in Anamalai, TN, and local traditional martial arts Kalari & Silambam in Coimbatore, TN.

Our support towards health in rural communities has been largely focussed upon strengthening the quality and reach of existing public health systems. We have worked with Primary Health Centres (PHCs), enabling their last-mile connectivity with the provision of e-bikes. Additionally, through WaSH interventions we have contributed to community health by establishing community toilets and community water ATMs that make potable water cheap and accessible.

Telemedicine has revolutionized healthcare in Rural Bengaluru, with centers recording large numbers of consultations each month. With the PHCs taking full ownership, this project promises strong sustainability at a low cost.

Livelihood

Livelihood interventions through Rural Rising are focussed on providing support to individual community members, generally either marginalized women, youth, or people with disabilities (PwD). This year, women received training in tailoring, and youth and PwDs were trained towards various skills.

Our intervention to provide **solar lights to rural communities** ensures sustainable, affordable access to light while reducing the dependence on non-renewable sourced electricity.



DIVERSITY EQUITY INCLUSION



A number of our projects focus on marginalized communities, this year with a strengthened focus on improving accessibility and providing livelihood opportunities to disabled and marginalized individuals. Within the LGBTQ community, a new Safe Space centre with individual livelihood support aims to lift the community in Bengaluru. A new collaborative effort with local bodies in Bengaluru has provided over 100 women with livelihood support. We continue to raise awareness towards gender equality for the next generation.



This year, the GendHer campaign reached new locations in different parts of the country. It was aimed at addressing the prevalent taboos and lack of conversations around gender, by providing gender sensitivity and inclusion trainings, and upskilling Anganwadi Workers in these locations.
